This product contains titanium dioxide. Cancer of the lungs has been associated with titanium dioxide. No exposure to titanium dioxide is anticipated during normal intended use of 3M Coated Abrasives, Surface Conditioning, and Ceramic Grain Products. No detectable respirable titanium dioxide was found when simulated grinding air sampling studies were conducted on analogous coated abrasive and surface conditioning constructions that contained similar to or greater concentrations of titanium dioxide. No detectable respirable titanium dioxide was noted when air sampling studies were conducted on processing ceramic grains containing similar to or greater concentrations of titanium dioxide. Therefore, the health effects associated with titanium dioxide are not expected during the intended use of this product.

SECTION 7: HANDLING AND STORAGE

7.1 HANDLING
